BIRMINGHAM DIRECTOR'S REPORT

Adapting Marketplace Ministry in a Pandemic: The Genius of Jesus' Methodology

Jesus' ministry was one of proclamation and personal discipleship. He preached the message, "Repent, for the Kingdom of Heaven is near", and he trained twelve men for three years by teaching, modeling, and encouraging the disciples in the good news of the Kingdom. When Jesus ascended to heaven, one of the marks of the ministry that He instilled into them was the ability to adapt and contextualize the good news to whatever people and situation they encountered.

This has been so important for our ministry to remember this year. The early church, under threat of arrest and execution, met in sewers and catacombs to worship. The church was not a place. This utterly befuddled Roman emperors like Diocletian, who burned many churches, and then wondered why the Christians continued to grow in number.

Likewise, we have had to continually remember the roots of YBL's ministry,

which started 39 years ago. It began with the burden of businessmen for their co-workers. It was not a burden to have public events, but a burden that other people did not know the good news about Jesus. Events have been a strategy to help connect businessmen with the gospel. But, God can accomplish what He wishes without public events.

Paul, writing to the Philippians, explained that though he was imprisoned for the testimony about Jesus, "God's word is not chained" (Philippians 1:14). Our inabilities do not limit God, but rather become the means through which God makes Himself seen and understood.

In Birmingham, small groups and mentoring continued this year, becoming a valuable place of encouragement when even many churches were not able to meet in person. The physical needs of people in our community became an opportunity to show tangible love to

those who were impacted and isolated, whether it was blood donation or food or material goods or even assisting other non-profits. We did a series of discipleship lessons and videos to keep our groups focused on the gospel. Vocational outreach to High Schools and Universities looked different – but created new opportunities to show how Jesus priorities shape our work and plans.

We are grateful for the good news of Jesus, which every person in the marketplace needs. The form and strategies of making Him known might change, but Jesus Christ is the same, "Yesterday, today and forever" (Heb 13:8).

God's faithfulness and our desire to faithfully serve working women has been the driving force behind many of our creative ministry efforts this year. WBL's Small Group Leaders befriended faithfulness right away, stepping up and showing up for their groups by using Zoom, Skype, Group texts, Facebook Groups, the list goes on. Small Groups have always served a vital role in our ministry. Now more than ever, they have proven to be a place of shalom for women in need. While working from home has its perks, it has blurred the lines between work and home, making many women feel "always on," like they must be available to work 24/7, impacting their productivity and mental health. For some, the burden of parenting and running a household while also working a job during the pandemic has created a pressure cooker environment and women are bearing the brunt of it.

WBL sees that woman. Through the ministry of WBL, I pray that weary woman knows God sees her too. By God's grace, WBL hosted two Online Events this year, reaching women with the hope of the gospel, in the comfort of their own homes. Both of our speakers shared powerful testimonies of God's faithfulness through their suffering. 
INTRODUCING: NATHAN ELDRIDGE
